NCC ENROLLMENT---RECORD HIGH!

Ninety-one students enrolled for the first semester of the 1962-63 school year--a record high. The previous record was set one year ago when 89 enrolled. Before that the highest figure was 69 in 1960. NCC is growing, praise God.

But figures indicate it takes about \$600 per student to keep dear old NCC perking! How many students do you have here? And how much money do you send. To tell the truth, if you have sent none, of your people to NCC, the least you could do would be to send some money and pray for your alma mater.

Keep working to break 100 in enrollment next year.

NCC BASKETBALL

The NCC basketball teams, coached by student Dale Chitwood, do very well considering that time and money problems make it virtually impossible for them to practice--and we are glad that basketball, good as it is, does not come before studies at NCC.

The first team has a record of 2 won, 3 lost. Two of those were lost in a tournament at Manhattan, Kansas, to MBC and Ozark BC. The other loss was to Platte Valley BC, over whom NCC was also victor once. The other victory was over Omaha Baptist BC. Future games include Wayne B team there Dec. 7; Omaha BBC there Jan. 11; PVBC here Jan. 22; Midwest CC here Febr. 1.

The NCC 2nd team lost their only game to the Park Avenue Christian Church team.

The following is the letter you couldn't read in the last issue of the News. We reprint it below with apologies. It is from our new president, Duane King.

Dear Friends,

I am honored to be chosen as president of the NCC Alumni Association, and I pray that with your wholehearted cooperation we can together lead this association to even higher goals than have already been reached. The NCC Alumni Association need not be, should not be, and is not another ineffective "Ministerial Association" kind of organization. We are not torn between loyalty to the Association and loyalty to the congregation we serve (as in a Ministerial Association); rather when we are loyal to one we are loyal to the other, when we serve one we serve the other. We are not torn between supporting the Association and supporting NCC; when we support one we support the other.

This Association, though naturally claiming many ministers and their wives as members certainly has room for and needs the interest of every person who attended NCC this is an Alumni Association, not just a Preacher Association.

I am a relatively new member of the AA, but old enough to have seen the Association grow in activity and number of people involved. 4:30 - Snak-Yak

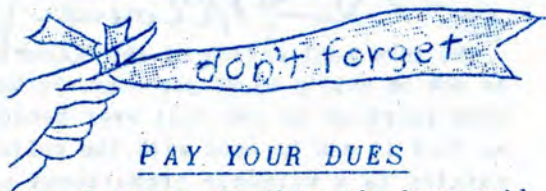
5:15 - Dinner

We appreciate Harold's letter, and believe the question he raises will be answered in the following report.

The committee which was appointed to formulate a policy to be incorporated in the constitution, submit the following:

Re incorporation: upon a lawyer's advice, do not recommend incorporating because of the expense involved. Money given for Alumni sponsored projects is tax deductible if given directly to the college but designated for Alumni projects.

Following are the amendments to the By Laws as suggested by the committee:

Article III Part 6:

All aforesaid members (part 3) are eligible to vote in the election of the Association's officers, and on other matters not involving the expenditure of Alumni Association funds.

Article III Part 7:

In matters involving the expenditure of Alumni Association funds, only members whose dues of the previous year are paid and whose current dues are not more than 60 days delinquent are eligible to vote. This amendment to become effective on Founder's Day, 1964.

Article VI Part 1:

Revise to read by adding: 'and shall assume their duties beginning with the Founder's Day Meeting.'

Article VII Part 1:

Revise by changing: 'Commencement' to read 'Founder's Day.'

Article IX Part 4:

The Alumni Association will assume the payment of the dues of each graduate of Nebraska Christian College for the first year of membership in the Alumni Association.

Article IX Part 5:

The Alumni Association will assume the payment of the dues of each graduate of Nebraska Christian College who is serving as a foreign Missionary for the duration of their service outside of the United States.

Essentially, what the foregoing does, is change the fiscal year from March to March to September to September. The annual meeting and election of officers will remain in March, but new officers will not assume office until Founder's Day.

The amendments also establish voting privileges and payment of dues.

SOMETHING TO CROW ABOUT

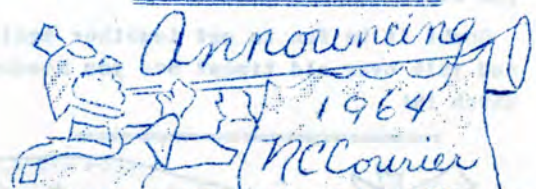

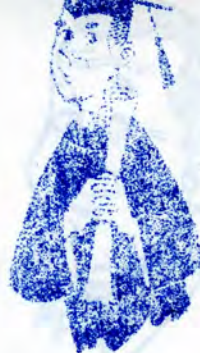
