The purpose of Christians' Hour is to combat liberalism, formalism and worldliness in the church and to present over the air the New Testament Gospel as taught by Christ Himself and the apostles of the early church.

It has no sponsor. It depends entirely upon the gifts from individuals, churches and church groups for its support.
