N.C.C. is on the Move

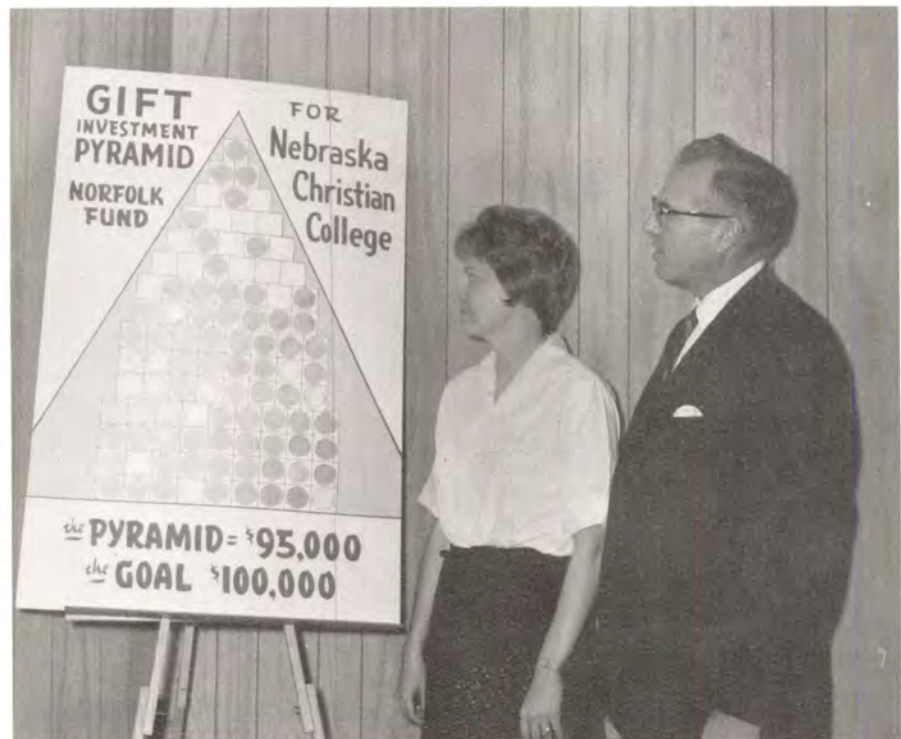
We dedicate this part of the annual to the expansion project of Nebraska Christian College. The crowded class rooms, library and dormitory facilities have made expansion necessary. With the guidance of the Lord and faithful Christians, the eighty-five acres of land purchased north-west of Norfolk will become a beautiful campus. The businessmen of Norfolk have confidence in Nebraska Christian College and have committed themselves to over \$87,000 and they are working for \$100,000 which they hope to accomplish in three years. Housing for 250-500 students, athletic field, and a library are among the plans for the new campus.

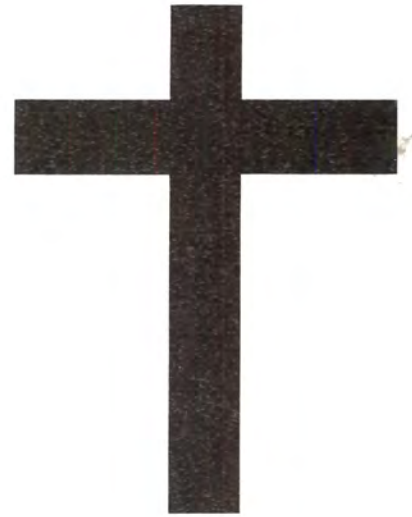

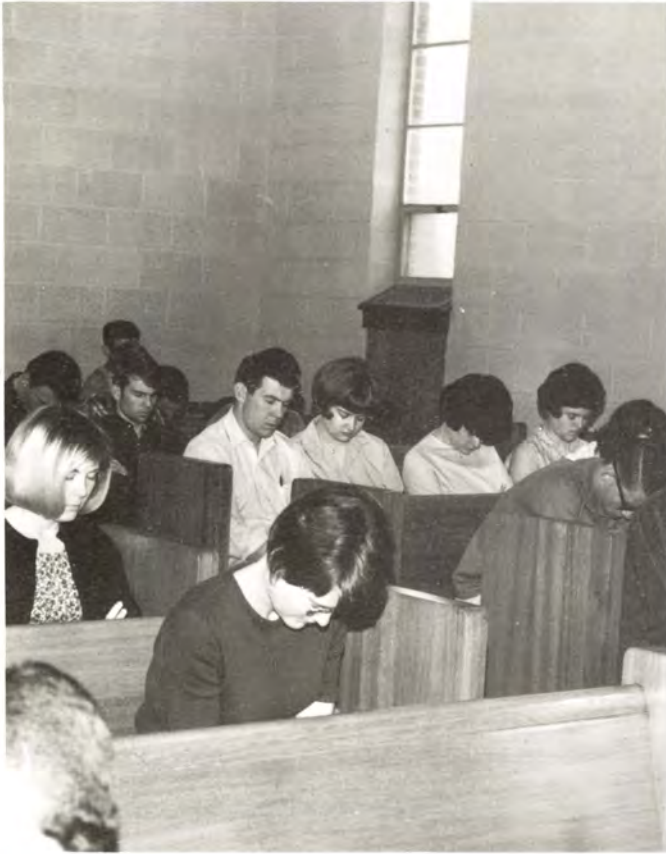

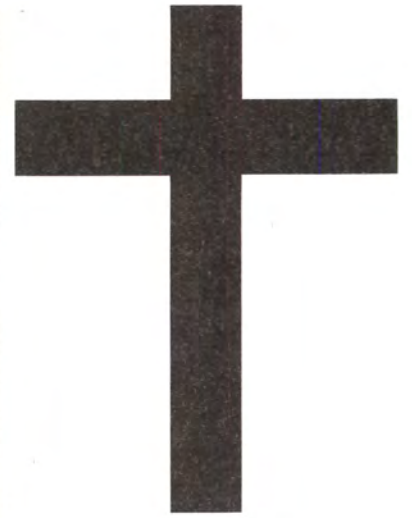

Students Study...

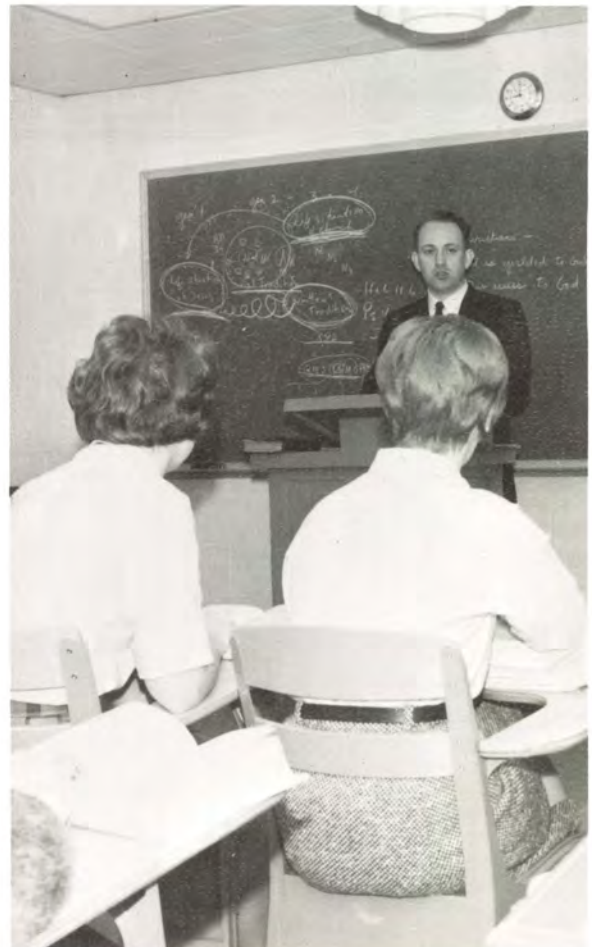

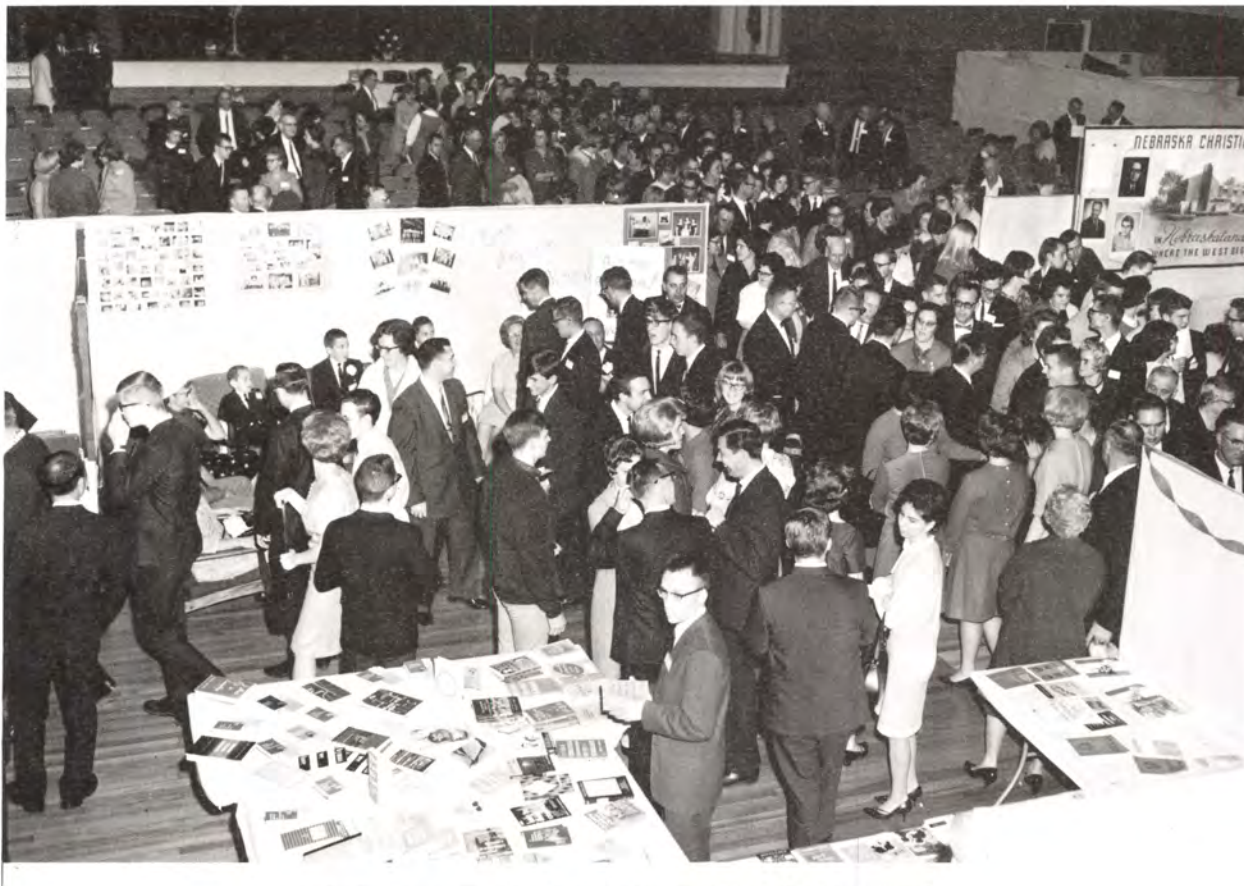

Delegates enjoyed a banquet with the theme "Showers of Blessings".



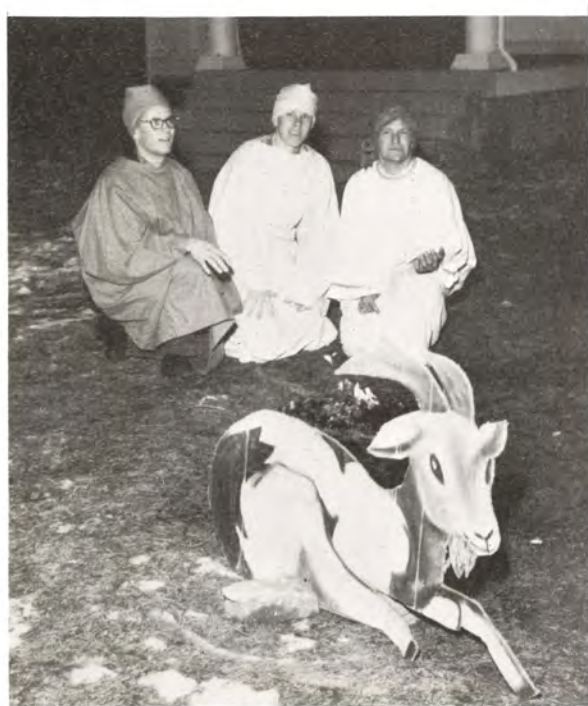

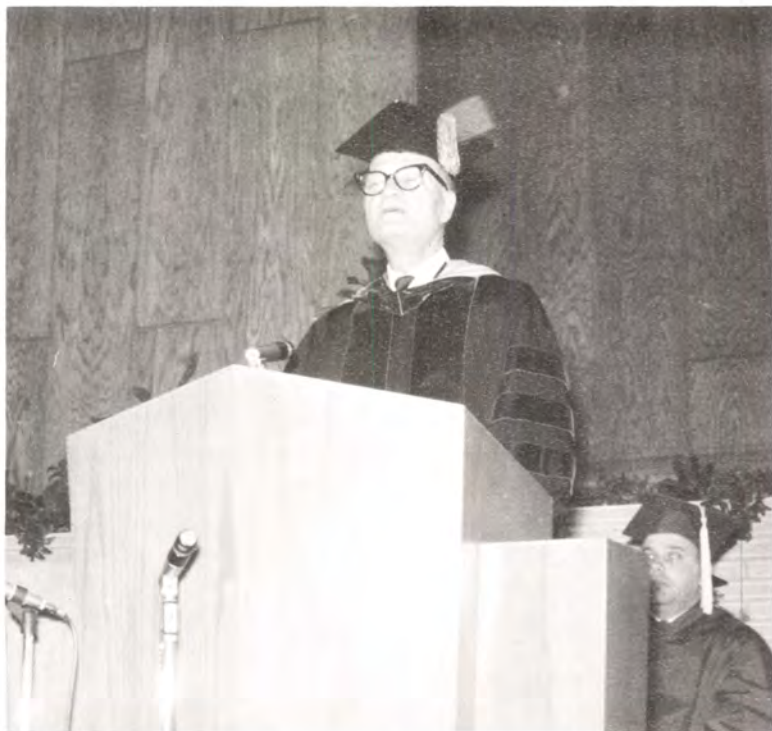
