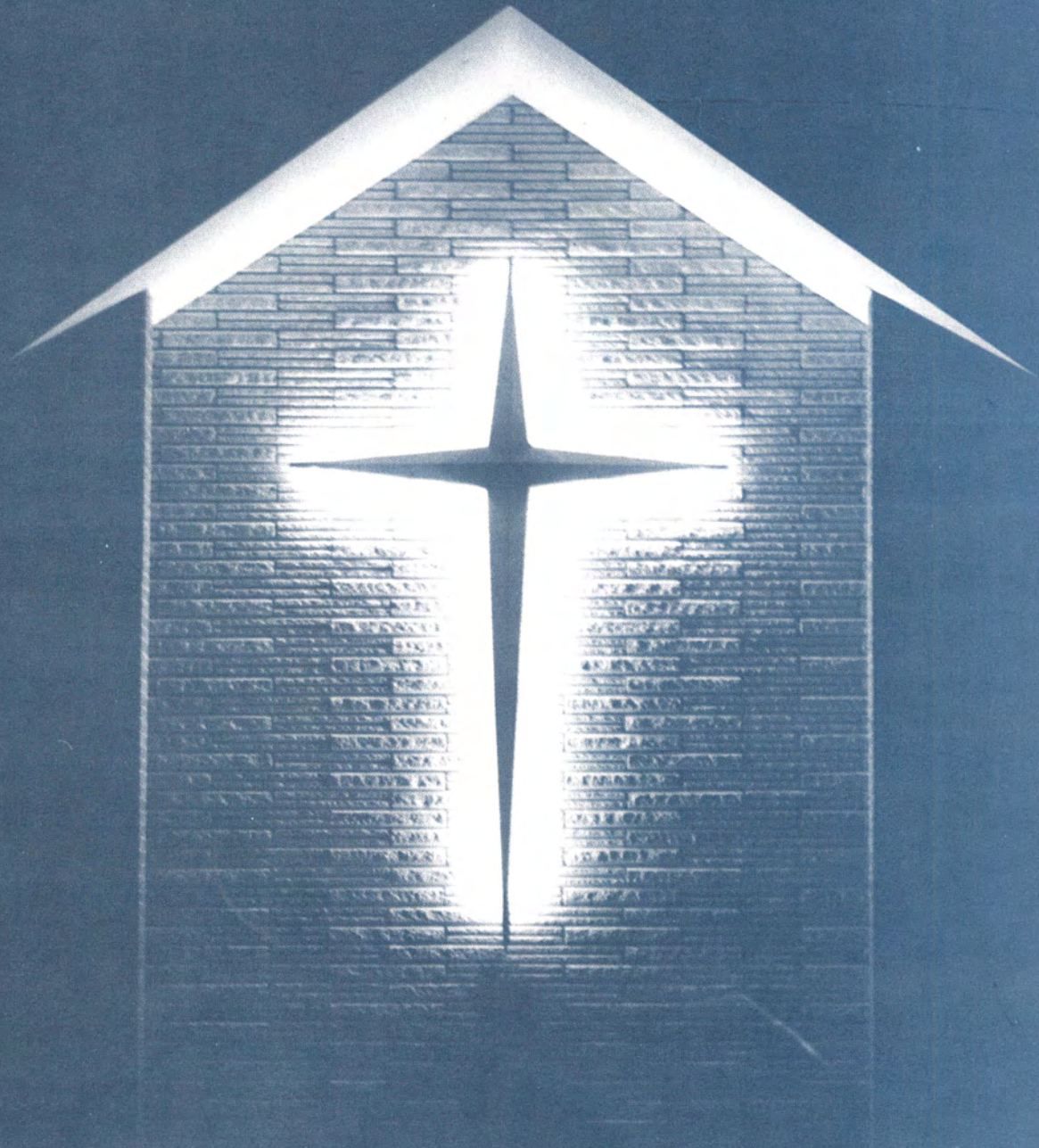

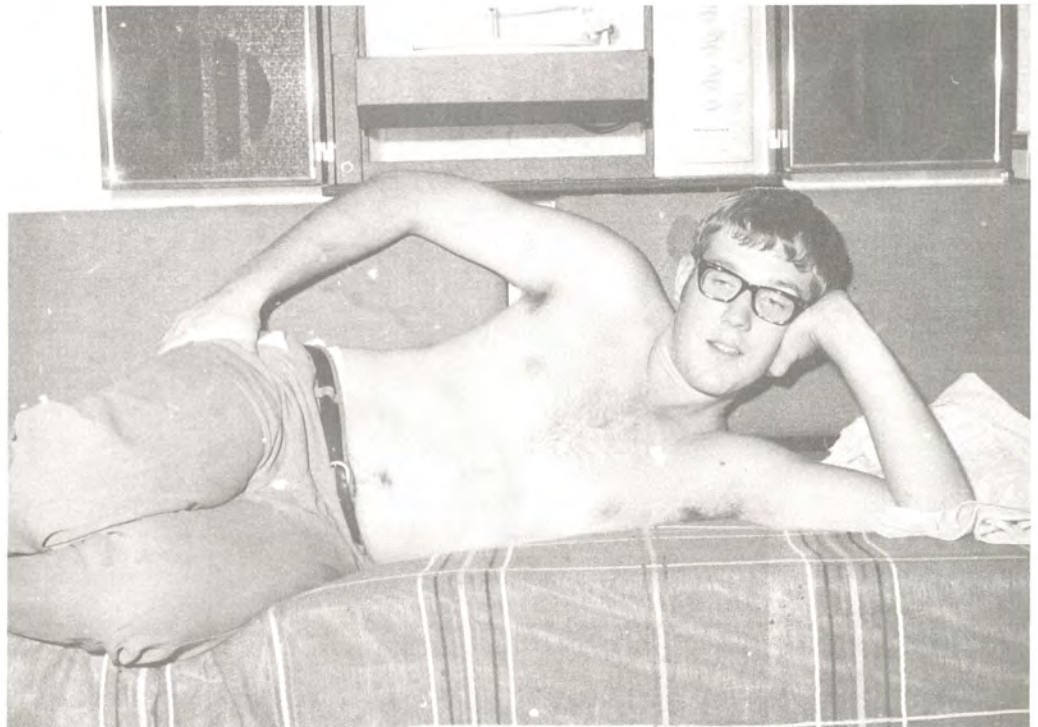

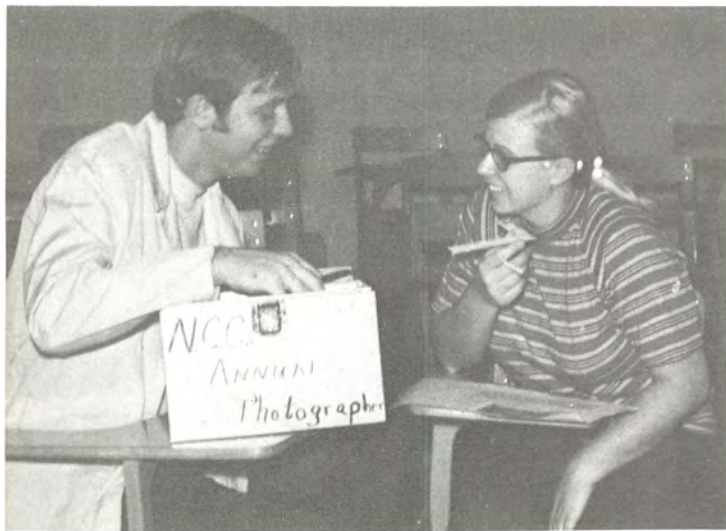

The job of the week end minister will sometimes provide wide varieties of experience. The one first thought of is the preaching experience as demonstrated by Al Hook.

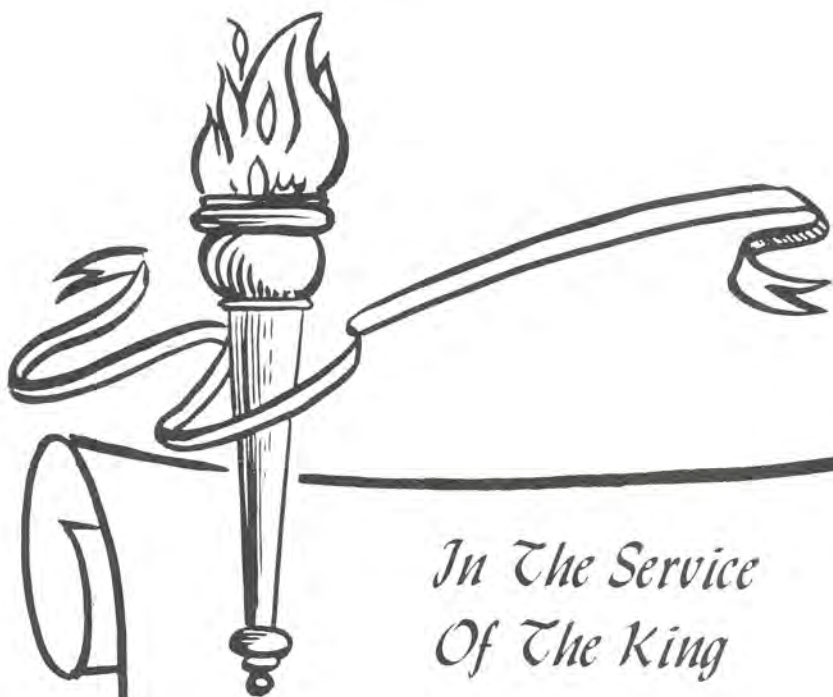


While preaching is a key part of the ministry, it is soon discovered that other parts of service play key roles also. Calling and many other duties require time of the student minister.

has held successful ministries in several Midwest states. He served NCC as professor and Dean before becoming President in 1953.



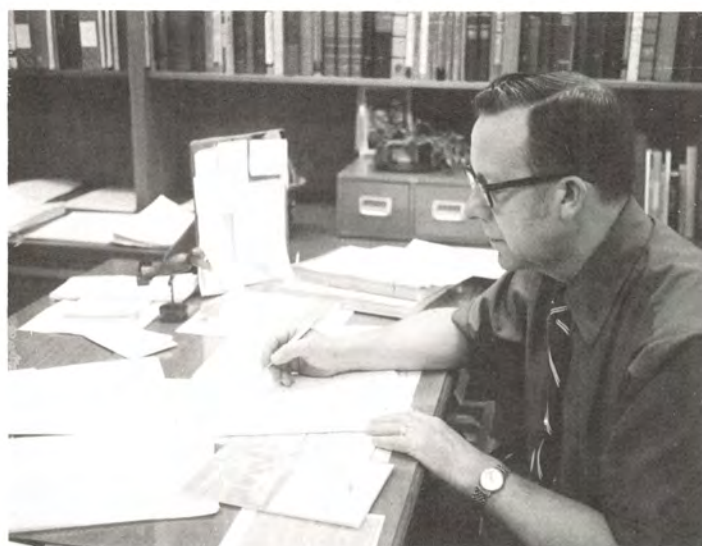

Guidance In All Things

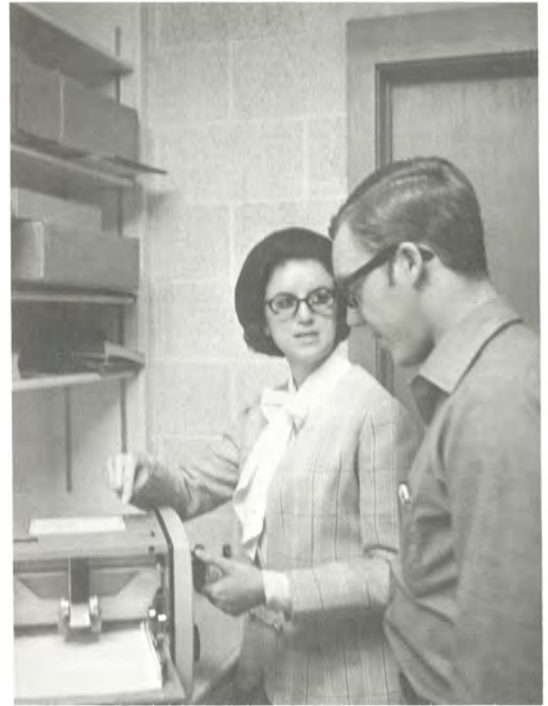

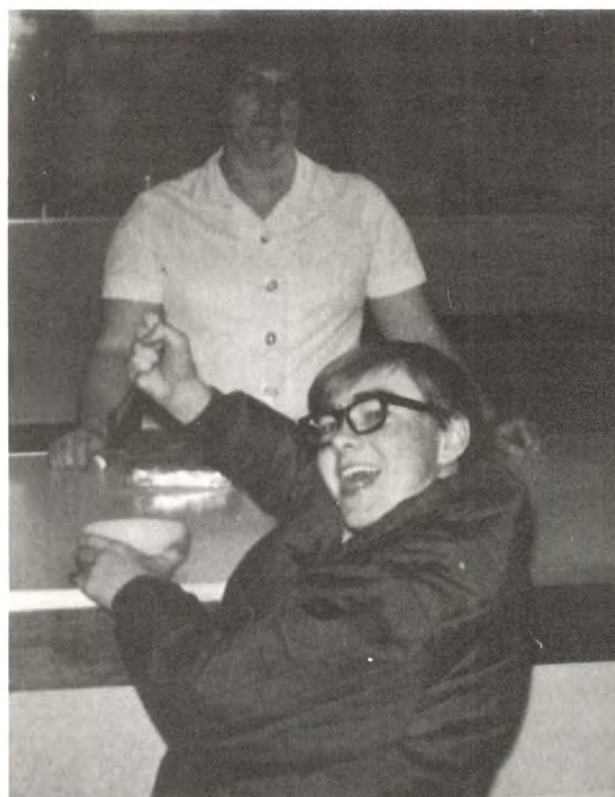


Mrs. JoAnn Utterback delighted the appetites of the students with many a tempting treat. While it is impossible to please everyone all the time JoAnn did a great job.

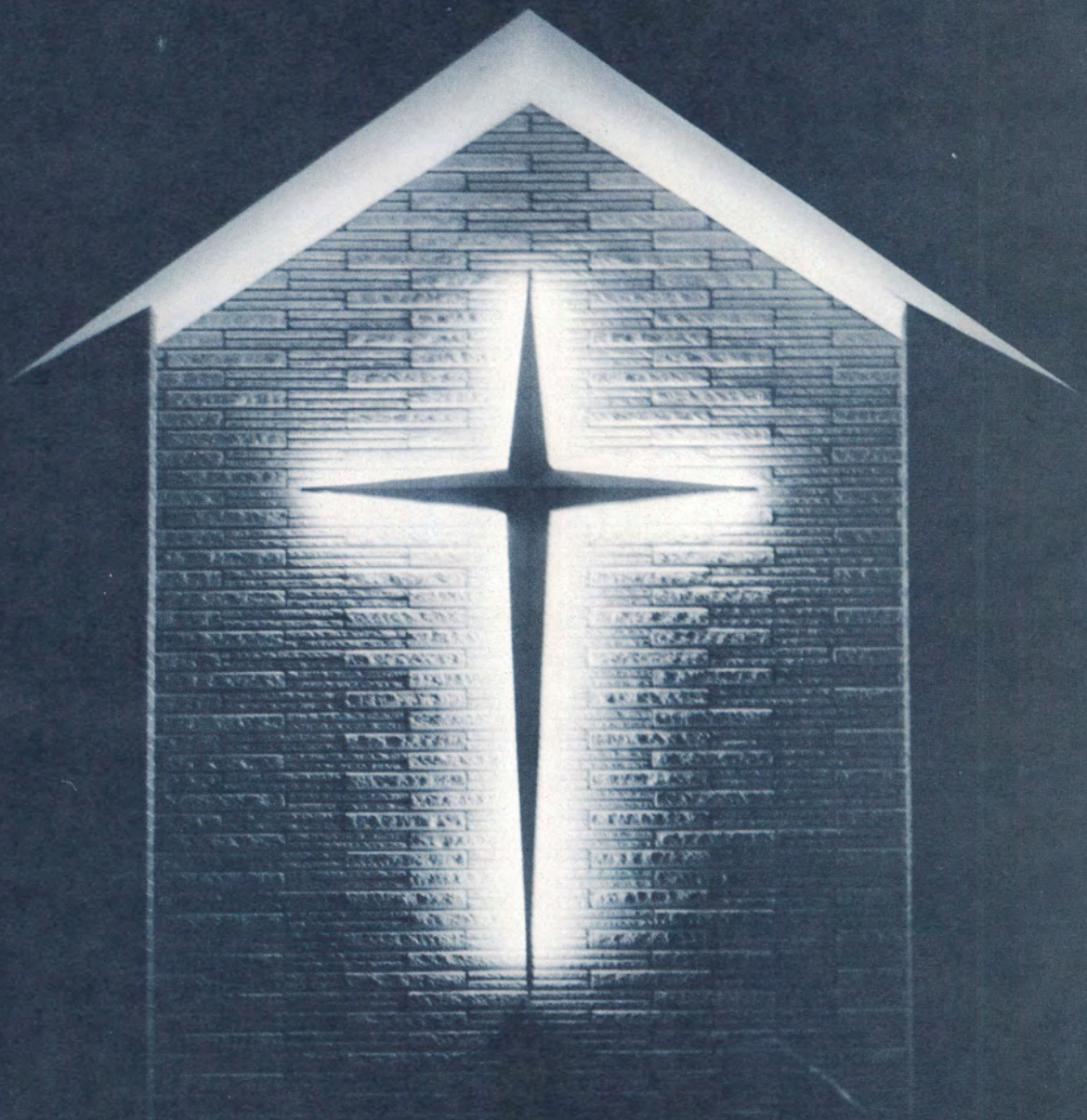

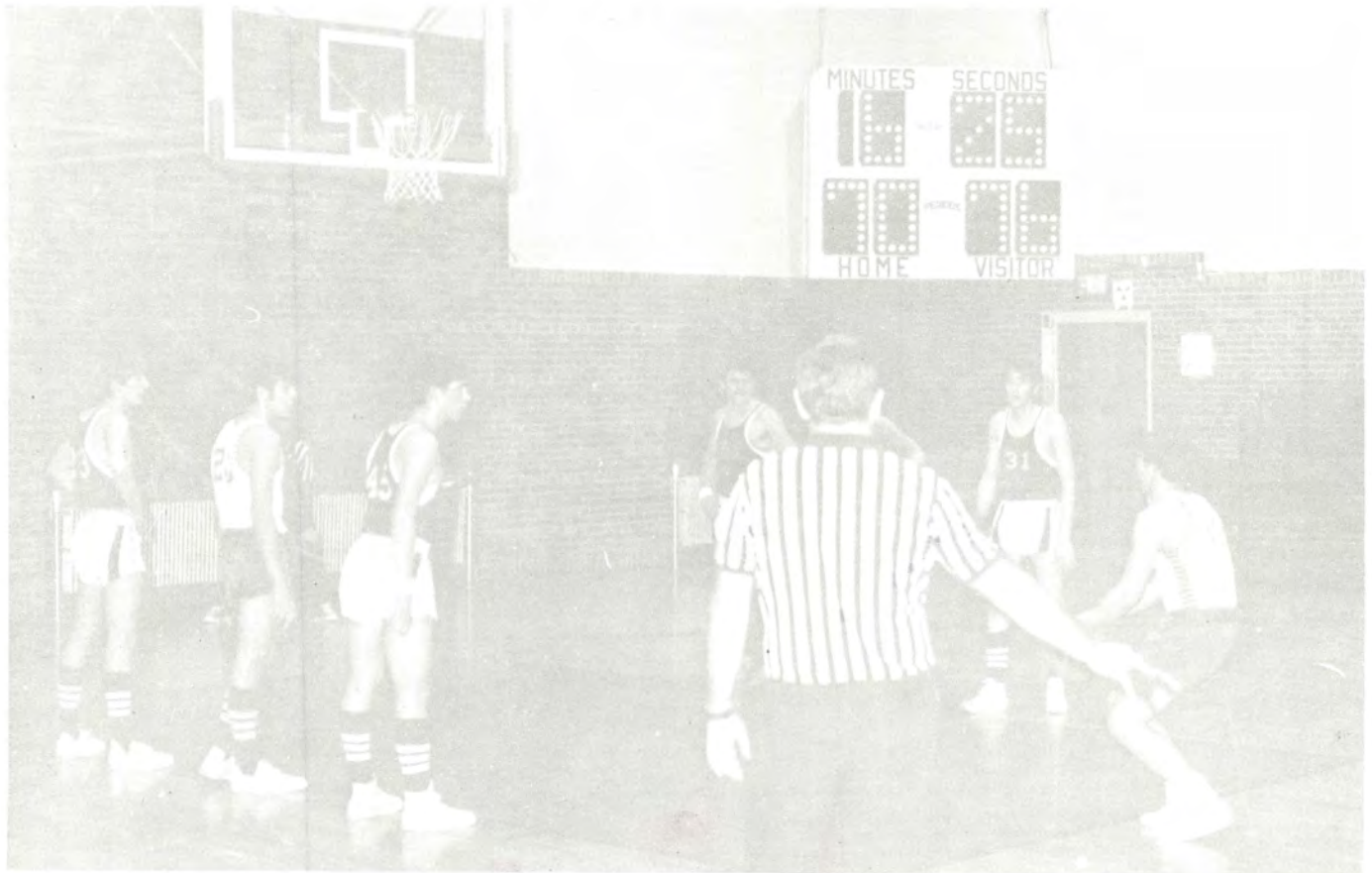

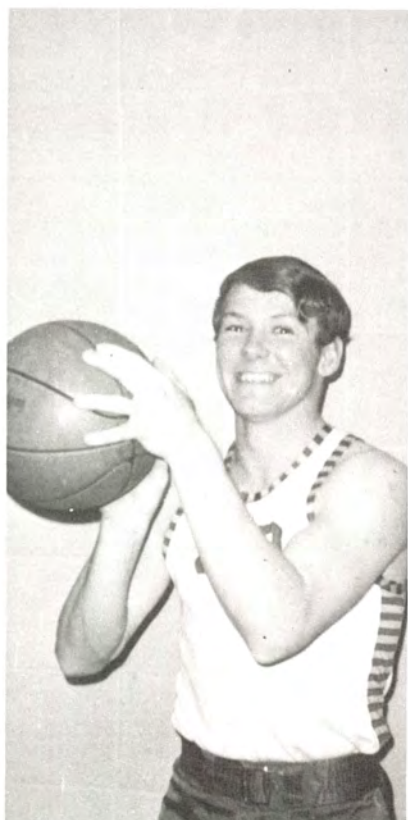

Neal Hauxwell positions himself at the free-throw line.





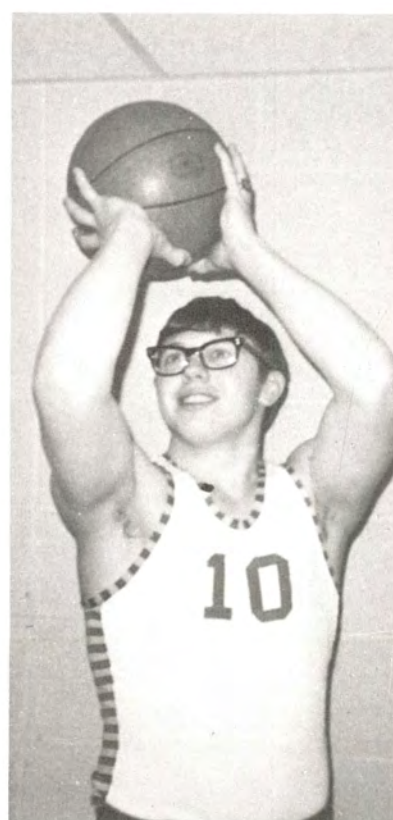

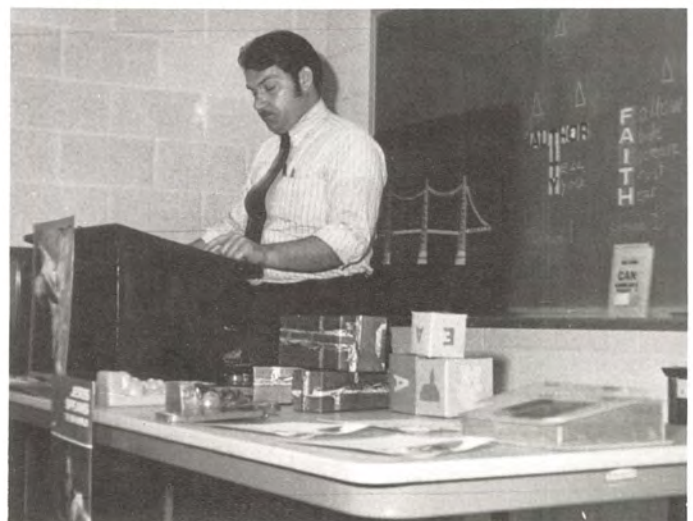
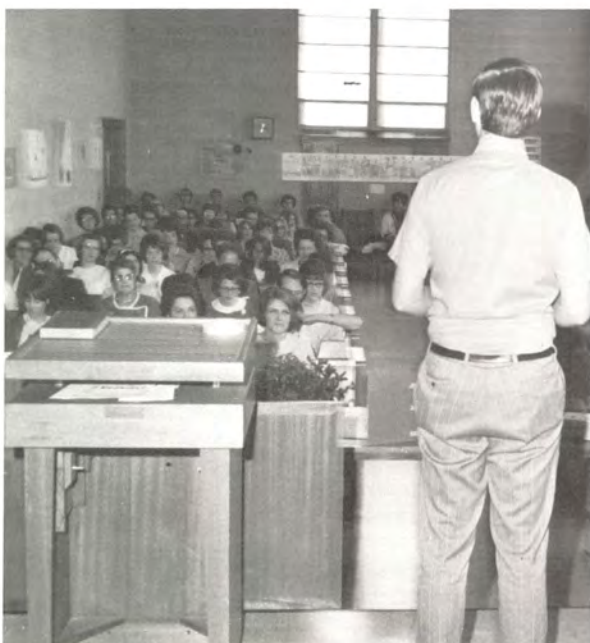
