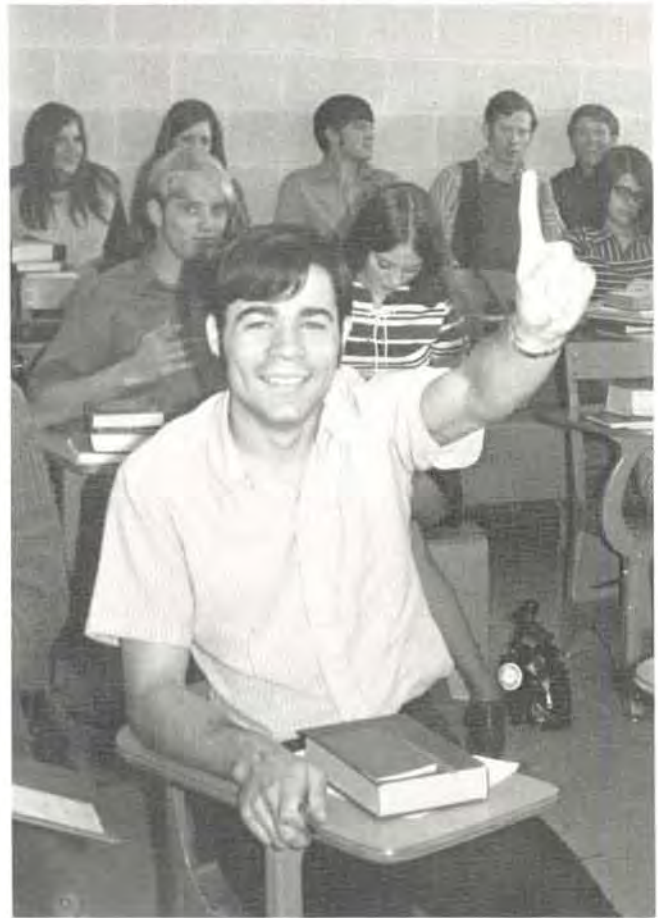

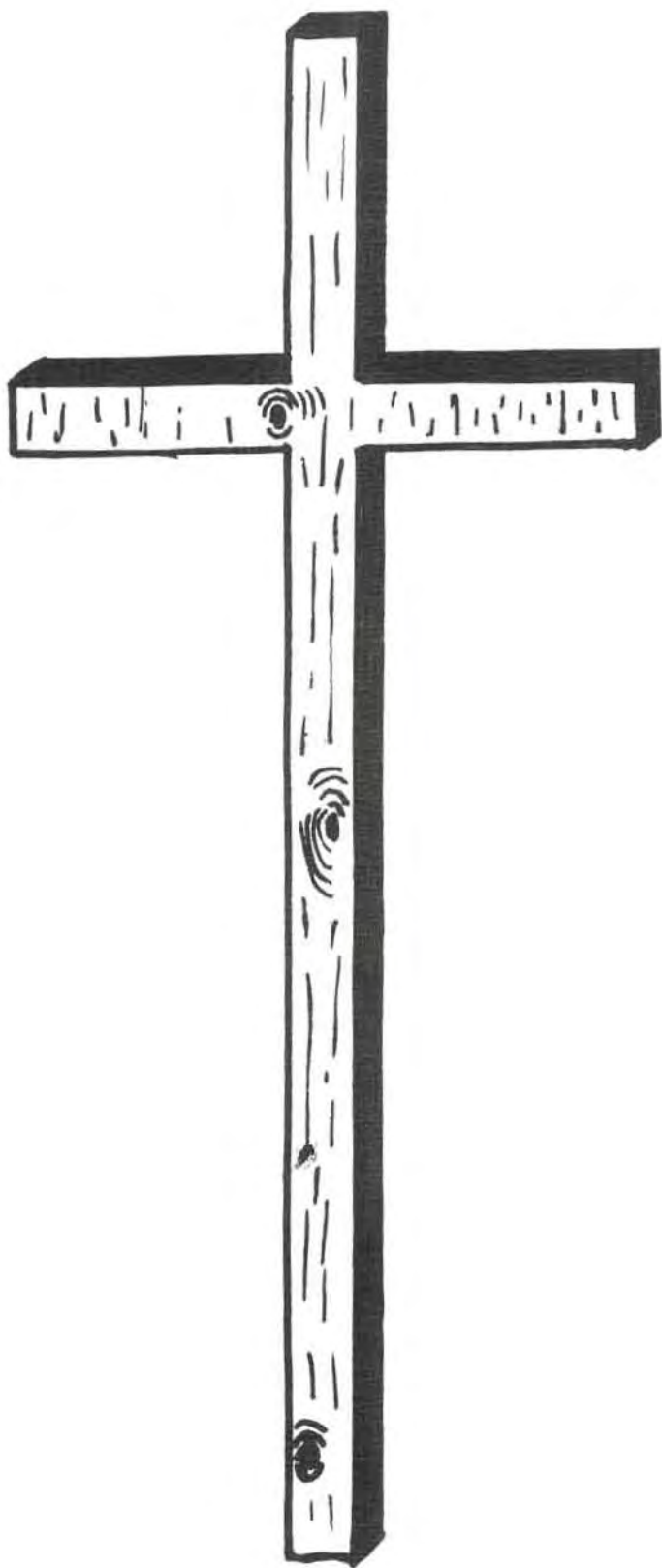


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From The Old

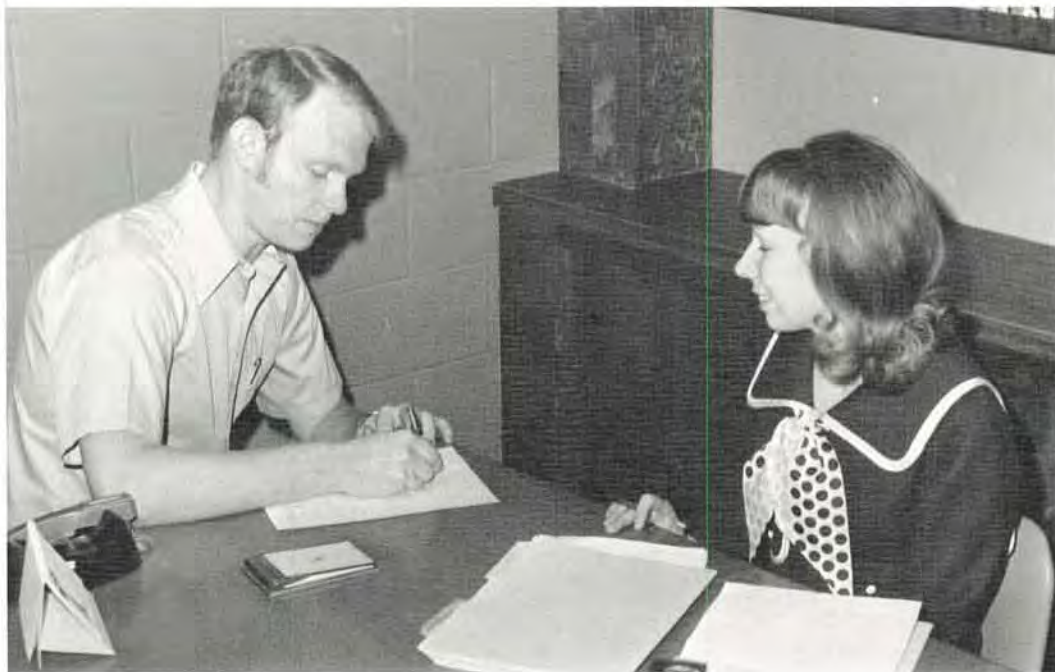

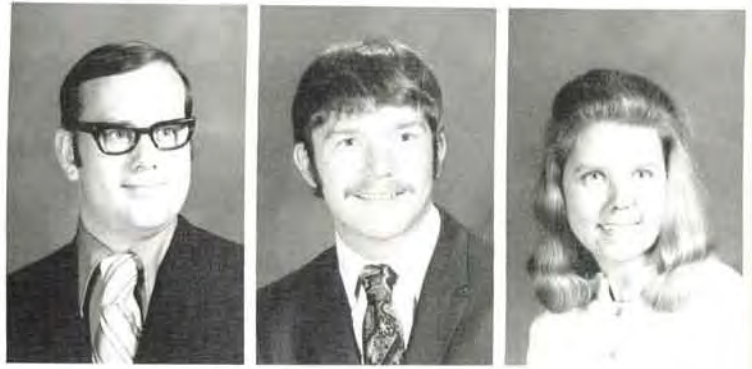

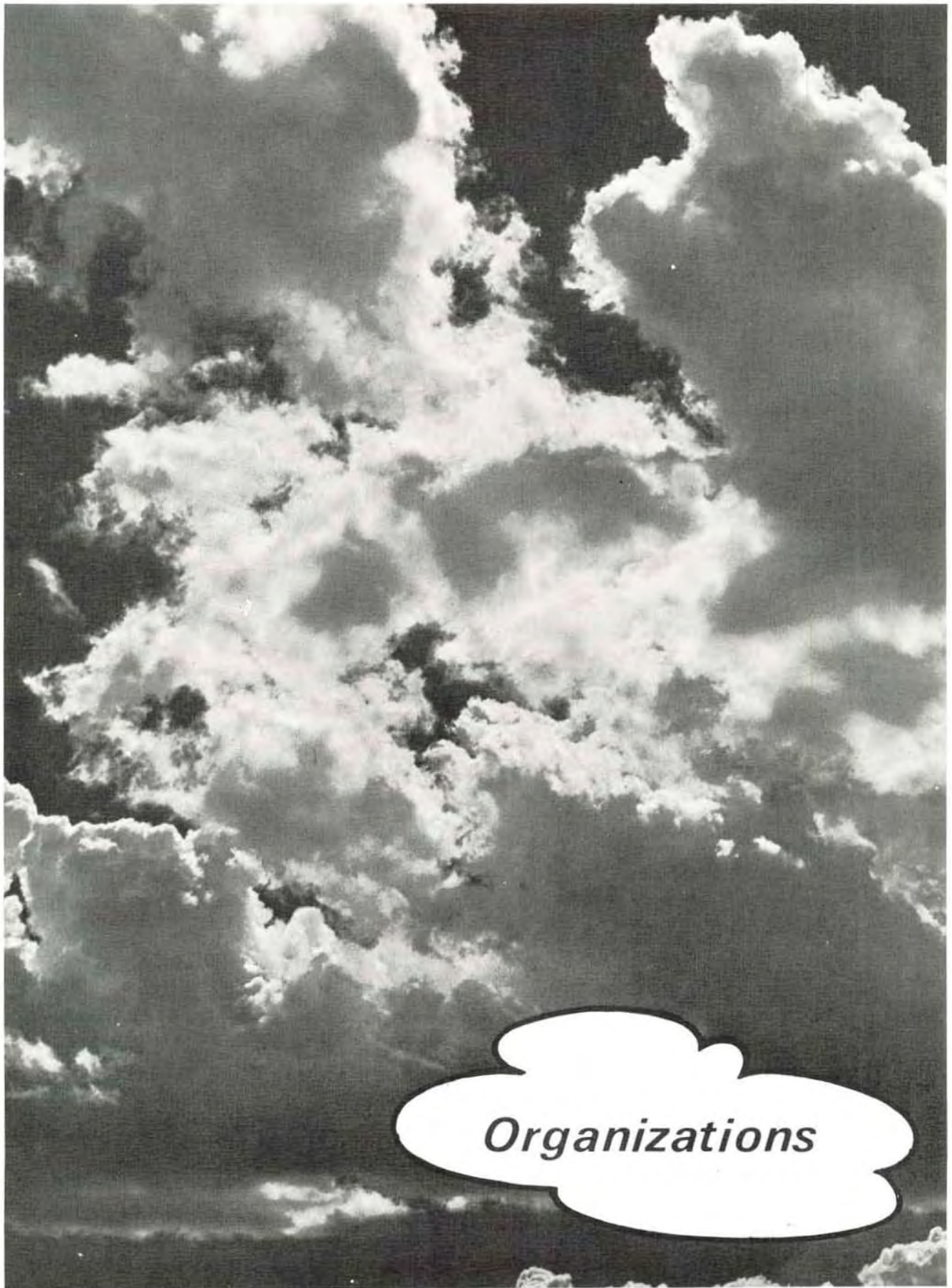

Missions Committee

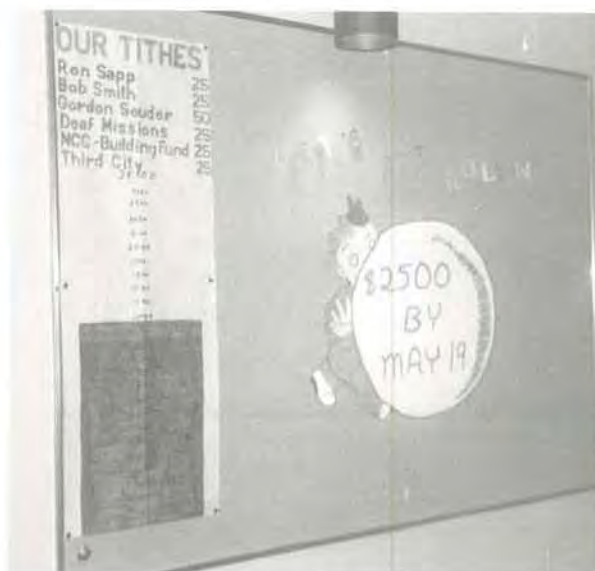


Many clever bulletins were displayed to remind students of their goal to support missionaries throughout this year.

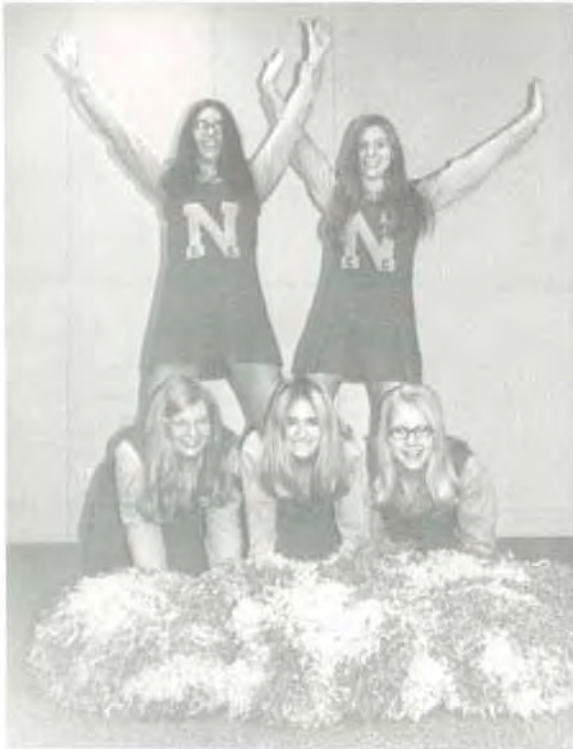
Assistant Editor, Bob Milliken challenged the crowd as he gave the devotional thought for the Box Social.

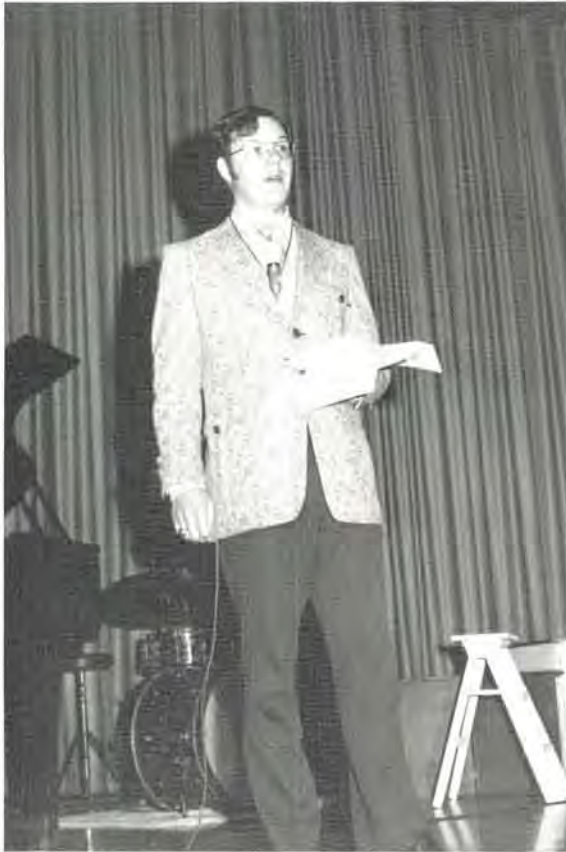
Fall Formal-1971
